  - c. What are the requirements of someone becoming a U.S. citizen? Think back to our activity where you helped someone become a **citizen**. (Hint: there are 5!)
  - d. List the different types of foreign born citizens and briefly describe them (such as illegal vs. **resident aliens**)
  - e. Know what a **Natural born citizen** is

  - a. What is the difference between a citizens duties vs. responsibilities?
  - b. What are the **duties** of a U.S. citizen?
  - c. What are the **responsibilities** of U.S. citizens?

  - a. Review the different forms of government and how to describe them (See your Chart! Text Book or Prezi can help too!)

  - a. Review the different systems of government (**confederal, federal, unitary, etc.**) on pg.77 and know where power is distributed for each; i.e. do states have more power or does the federal (also called national government have more power in each?)
